

The players settle back in their chairs, the lights are trained over the black and white of the age-old, endless battle, the clock is started and the opening moves in another Armchair Treasure Hunt commence...

Somewhere within half a mile of the M25 I have buried a small box. Your task is to find it. Clues can be found in the following sets of general-knowledge questions, including the coded message, and in the accompanying pictures. There will be prizes for the first finder of the box as well as for the best solutions to the entire puzzle.

The answer to each of the questions is a single word or a short phrase. It is no secret that the first letters of each non-numeric answer spell out another question, the answer to which may (or may not) be useful in locating the Treasure. Use surnames except where stated and omit 'the', 'an' etc. if necessary. You should ensure that all your answers fit this connecting sentence. If they do not then either you are wrong or you have found an answer other than the one I was after. In the latter case, you should try to find 'my' answer. Marks will only be given for alternatives if they are accompanied by some sort of justification.

The marking scheme gives most points for those questions found to be the hardest. Marks will be awarded for answers to the 64 numbered questions and for finding the treasure (earliest finders getting the most points). There are no marks available for anything else.

If you find the treasure-box, then read the instructions inside. Replace it in its original position, having consideration for later finders. There is a possibility that the box will be found by someone unconnected with the competition; if you are sure you have reached the right place (you will know if you have!) and there is nothing there, then please try to contact me.

There is no 'entry form' - any piece of paper is fine so long as the answers are legible. You need not justify any of your answers unless you wish to; in most cases, the single word or short phrase for each one is sufficient. However, some extra information is required for a few of the answers, as you will see. Don't forget to attach the ticket from the Treasure-box if you find it.

There are four prizes, all of Harrods vouchers. The first finder of the Treasure box will get £50. There will be another £50 for the person gaining the most marks and there are also second (£30) and third (£20) prizes in this category. No person/team may win more than one prize. Also note that this year's £50 prizewinners will not be allowed to win prizes in the 1990/91 competition (if there is one).

Entries must reach me by Friday, January 5, 1990. Answers and results will be sent out as soon as possible after this, but only to people who have entered the competition. If, by any chance, the Treasure has not been found, then additional clues will be issued, again only to those people who have entered. I suggest that all entrants keep a copy of these questions, together with their answers.


